LEVERAGE FEDERAL, STATE, AND LOCAL FUNDING SOURCES

Most districts leverage a combination of <u>IDEA grants</u> and similar formula and competitive grants distributed via the Office of Special Education Programs. It can be overwhelming, but there is always an opportunity to fund a RoboKind program through federal, state, or local grants. Below is a quick snapshot of line item funding with grants.

THE IMPORTANT GRANTS TO HELP YOUR DISTRICT

As an in-classroom, evidence-based intervention, RoboKind's SEL programs are uniquely qualified for ESSA and IDEA funding.

ESSER I/II & ARP LIMITED TIME ONLY

In order to support the needs of schools and students during the COVID pandemic, Congress added approximately \$180 billion in additional funding. The most recent \$128 billion is distributed through the Title 1 formula.

IDEA, PART D

COMPETATIVE: A little known section of IDEA funds "national activities" aimed at improving the education of children with disabilities. This includes competitive grants!

TITLE I, PART A

FORMULA: Improving the Academic Achievement of the Disadvantaged. Allocates funds for evidence-based purchases to improve academic performance.

TITLE IV, PART A

COMPETITIVE: Student Support & Academic Enrichment (SSAE) Grants support "effective use of technology" and PD for teachers.

TITLE V, PART A

FORMULA: Designed to improve academic achievement and quality of education for all students, specifically through the use of innovative programs.

MEDICAID

While more complicated to manage, several of our partners have used direct Medicaid billing to fund services delivered to special needs students.

IDEA, PART B

FORMULA: IDEA Part B provides over \$12 billion in federal funding every year to State Education Agencies, which in turn distribute according to special needs student enrollment.

TITLE II, PART A

FORMULA: Most districts use Title II funding to improve the efficacy of their educators via Professional Learning that is job-embedded, specific and relevant to student needs.

<u>1003A</u>

FORMULA & COMPETITIVE: In order to use 1003A school improvement funds, partners and programs must be evidence-based.

ROBOK

21ST-CENTURY COMMUNITY CENTERS

COMPETITIVE: Specifically meant for rural and innercity schools or co-ops, these grants enable implementation of social services needed for the community.

SECTION 7003

Ideal for districts with federally connected students, including Indian lands and uniformed services.
